To our community

A campaign is an indicator of the strength of an institution's community. And, closing at 140% of goal and with more than 6,000 donors. Keene State College's community has a tremendous amount to be proud of.

When the campaign began in July 2021, our goal of \$20 million was ambitious, but our funding needs were clear: to increase access to a Keene State College education for more students; to ensure the best possible experience once a student was on campus; and to build high-impact experiences that would serve both as life-changing experiences and pathways into the workforce.

Built alongside Keene State's current strategic plan, these funding needs created the following three campaign priorities:



STUDENT SUPPORT

Some institutions claim they open doors for their students, but at Keene State, we are grounded in that pursuit and take every chance to prove it.

Student success stories show the pivotal role that the College plays in preparing future thinkers, leaders, and visionaries poised to make an impact.

Learning is about much more than completing tasks in the classroom. Real-world experiences, internships, and studying abroad are examples of the enriching learning opportunities Keene State offers in the liberal arts tradition.

We think of it as exploration with a purpose.

Here we look at how donor-funded scholarships helped two recent graduates advance their understanding of the world, elevate their appeal as job candidates, and begin careers in their chosen profession of teaching.

LOGAN PHILLIPS '25

MAKING MUSIC ... TEACHING MUSIC

The best thing Logan Phillips did as a student was to follow his passion for music.

It wasn't always a straight line, but in every instance, it was where he was drawn and where he returned.

Now the Keene State graduate (BM Music Education and BM Music Performance) has a "dream" first job as a music teacher at the Great Brook School in Antrim. Students in grades 5 to 8 attend Great Brook, the 2014 New Hampshire Middle School of the Year.

At Keene State, Logan discovered a love for bass and playing jazz, strengthened a passion for choral singing, and developed a vision to teach one day.

But his education was as much about learning away from the classroom, thanks to generous scholarships, important collaborations, and professional mentorship.

"Life-changing in so many ways," he said of his experiences abroad.

As a senior, Logan was awarded the Travis '94 & Gretchen Hodgdon Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship (SURF) award to broaden his musicianship in Sarteano, Italy, a commune in the Province of Siena in Tuscany.

The Hodgdon family endows five separate scholarships at Keene State. The first in his family to attend college, Travis Hodgdon worked as an EMT out of high school and then served a tour of duty in the US Navy before enrolling at Keene State College at age 25. Travis is now



a doctor of osteopathic medicine and lives with his family in Cooperstown, NY.

"Gretch and I are very grateful for all the opportunities we have been given in life and feel creating opportunities is the best way to give back. I remember the feeling of getting

scholarships decades ago while at Keene. It not only made my education financially possible, it was so encouraging to be supported by others who cared so much, like I do now, about Keene State. Creating the SURF grant took it to another level because it connects Keene, through it's students, to others in the world."

SURF grants provide financial support to sophomores, juniors, and seniors interested in conducting in-depth research projects under the guidance of a faculty mentor in their field of study. The grant from the Hodgdons enabled Logan to attend the two-week Choral Workshop as a tenor singer in the ensemble and present scholarly and creative activity on an international stage.

Choral musicians from across the globe participated in the workshop in Sarteano. Said Logan, "Our days were filled with music, getting to know each other, exploring the town, and spending evenings at an Airbnb, drinking wine, and singing choral classics." (cont.)

MAKING MUSIC ... TEACHING MUSIC (cont.)

On more than one occasion in the picturesque region of southern Tuscany, known for its archeology, the choral group he was a part of performed in the town square.

Customs, culture, and connections merged for Logan.

"I grew as a musician and singer in those two weeks. I was one of the handful of students still in their undergraduate program at the workshop; most of the others were in graduate programs, professional musicians, or educators, so I was able to learn a lot from my peers."

Led by renowned clinicians, rehearsals were effectively masterclasses unto themselves, Logan says.

"For me, music was my hobby and I never really considered pursuing it as a career, but when it came time to finally decide what college I was going to and what I wanted to study, I realized I wanted to do something that I had a passion for and enjoyed."

And now, he says, "I know I will love teaching middle school ... you can do so much musically with students at that age."



NICOLE GRACZEWSKI '24:

PATH PAVED WITH SCHOLARSHIPS

Having earned more than 20 different scholarship awards in high school and college combined, Nicole Graczewski has a deep appreciation and sense of gratitude for giving back and the capacity it has to help others.

Such generosity, she said, gave life to her aspirations to teach.

The Keene State graduate (Elementary Education and Dance Education) is a full-time kindergarten teacher at Andover Elementary/Middle School in Andover, NH.

Nicole received three endowed Keene State scholarships as an undergraduate student: the Sandra E. Ellison '67 Memorial Scholarship (three years), the Megna Family Endowed Scholarship (two years), and the Matthew T. Paul Resident Assistant Memorial Award (two years).

"It's impossible to describe the full impact of the support I received," Nicole said, "but being able to train my focus on my students and not worry



Teachers Helping Teachers: Nelson '59 And Dorothy '58 Megna Pay It Forward

Nelson '59 and Dorothy '58 Megna are two of the donors that made a Keene State education accessible to Nicole, and they know her story all too well: both graduated Keene State with their teaching degrees, and both—the firsts in their families to go to college—worked to put themselves through college.

In fact, Nelson had to take a year off from college in order to work. One silver lining of the pause was that Nelson and Dottie's first child (of four), born on Keene's campus, was in attendance as an infant at her father's graduation.

Nelson and Dottie went on to have exemplary careers in teaching, education administration, and service to their communities. Their philanthropy at Keene has been dedicated to easing the financial burden of attending college for education students.

about money was a major benefit of all the scholarships. I did not have to work as many hours at my part-time job and therefore had more time to dedicate to lesson-planning, preparation, and my students."

Nicole came to Keene State from East Windsor, CT; today, she lives in Goffstown, NH.

Nicole has a lengthy resume of student involvement at Keene State, including tour guide, office assistant, and member and recruitment chair for the Education Honor Society, Kappa Delta Pi.

She enjoys baking, growing plants, boating, traveling, and learning everything she can "about the world around us."

But she loves teaching most. It has been that way since first grade, when her New Year's resolution was to become a teacher ... not after college, but that year! "I've always liked school, mostly because my teachers made it fun. Now I get to make it fun for my students. I feel lucky to wake up excited to go to work."

"Keene State encouraged me to be the teacher I wanted. I am nowhere near a textbook teacher. Dr. Darrell Hucks and Dr. Kim Bohannon helped me learn that it's okay to be the 'odd duck' of teachers. While student teaching, and even now, we make messes in class, learn outside, and get a little crazy. Most importantly, the children are learning!"

How crazy? "Like writing letters and sight words in shaving cream, to setting up tents indoors." She has found, she added, that taking an abstract approach to teaching gets more "buy-in" from students, even the youngest.

"That moment ... when you make a connection, when a student who might be struggling gets it ... there's nothing like that."

Donor generosity helps ensure that Keene State students leave our campus confident, inspired, tested, and ready to make an impact. Logan and Nicole are shining examples of how students excel when donors step up to help careers take shape.

Their transformative \$500,000 gift to the endowed Megna Family Scholarship supports students in the educator preparatory program that have financial need, with preference going to students that have engaged in community service. It is the first scholarship at Keene State to be formally set up to support students for their entire career at Keene State. Nelson and Dottie's scholarship will benefit 10-15 students a year in perpetuity—an extraordinary legacy for Nelson, Dottie, and their family of more than 50 children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren.



"We were motivated to give back to the place that brought us together and gave us the skills to have successful and service-oriented lives," said Nelson and Dottie. "We chose to give back in this way, in order to leave a legacy that will include something that will live far beyond either of us."

And students like Nicole will benefit—as will the students in their classrooms once they graduate—for generations to come.

At Keene State, excellence requires not only the programs and facilities that serve our students but also those who offer their time, wisdom, and financial generosity toward educating the next generation of leaders and professionals.

Here we look at some examples, including Owl Athletics; new academic options in optics and precision manufacturing to educate job-ready students and citizens in a growing and localized field; and how donor-funded scholarships are serving our students and helping to raise the visibility and mission of the Cohen Institute.



OWL ATHLETICS

How does the expression go? Crushing it! This is Keene State athletics today.

On the fields, courts, courses, and in the pool, what a run it's been, what a year it was, what eye-popping successes and accomplishments to take pride in.

On the fundraising side, supporters are behind it all, giving Owl teams and student-athletes the little extras that make a winning difference. For example: A golf tournament that brought in \$45,000, an Athletics Giving Challenge that raised \$87,000, and a Snap! Raise campaign that poured \$141,000 into the various team coffers.

"Donor generosity enables us to do all the things we can't get to do, or accomplish necessarily, with just funds from the budget," Keene State Athletic Director Marty Testo '98 said. "The support we get is extraordinary and difference-making."

Things like new equipment, facility upgrades, improved sound systems, and opportunities for student-athletes to travel domestically and abroad. Also, to have a deeper, full-immersion postsecondary experience.

In competition, some highlights to shout about:

The women's swim and dive team saw its run of 16 Little East Conference (LEC) titles come to an end in 2024, but began what it hopes will be a new streak when it captured conference title No. 20 overall this past season.

The Owl men's basketball team celebrated a fourth consecutive LEC title to earn a return trip to the NCAA Tournament. Its senior captain, Octavio Brito '25 of Lincoln, R.I., was later named National Player of the Year by the National Association of Basketball Coaches, a first for Keene State. The Owl cagers enjoyed a 33-week run with a national ranking in the top 20 during Brito's tenure in red and white. Brito finished his career as the Owls' second all-time scorer (2,206 points) and ranked in the top 10 in 14 other KSC statistical categories.

The men's and women's cross country teams walked—er, ran—away with **best-in-conference** showings, too, as did the baseball team.

Keene State claimed that prestigious honor, which measures overall institutional athletic performance among LEC members, this past year for the 18th time. KSC hoisted the Cup each of the first 16 years it was presented. Owl teams this year racked up big points by capturing regular-season league titles in five of 19 LEC sports. Men's swimming and diving, women's indoor and outdoor track & field, and field hockey garnered runner-up ranking points.



The Owl baseball team had a banner season, going on a mid- to late-season run, claiming a conference title and qualifying for the NCAA Tournament.

Coach Justin Blood said it's easy to forget all that goes into a successful season, on and off the field. He called it a shared experience that goes beyond just those in uniform.

"Staying connected, keeping the past alive, and sharing new memories is what the alumni experience should be," he said. "And we're fortunate the baseball program has that."

Take, for example, alumni Bob Simpson '73, a former Owl baseball player whose sister and son also attended Keene State.

Simpson and Coach Blood met in the summer of 2022. Sharing small talk in the dugout, Blood listened to a few fraternity stories from Simpson. Simpson asked the then-second-year coach what the program needed to be successful.



Blood pointed to a ratty, aging batting cage, noting that a double cage that was safe, spacious, and accessible to student-athletes amounted to a priority.

Bob agreed to support the project. Said Bob, "After we had landed on batting cages, and as we were walking back from the dugout, it occurred to me that it was the 80th anniversary of the Marines landing in Guadalcanal, where my dad served. I know I love baseball, and I know he fought for the freedom that we all enjoy."

Before a game in 2023, a small ceremony was held to recognize Simpson, who threw out the first pitch. A granite post in front of the cages bears the inscription "John A Simpson USMC," a son's tribute to his father. Bob was just 9 years old when his father died.

When asked why he decided to support Keene State's baseball program, Bob said: "When I was growing up, there were only two seasons: baseball and getting ready for baseball. My four years at Keene State were arguably the best years of my life. I was on the college's baseball team and part of a fraternity, TKE, which I was president of in my junior year. I have friends that I still keep in contact with."

Bob Simpson '73 didn't stop there. He wrote another check to cover the cost of new screens, infield mix, a new home plate, and mound tarps. He and Blood run into one another occasionally, as Simpson regularly attends games. Simpson and Blood, and their wives, Carol and Hannah, enjoyed a dinner together this past winter.

This past spring, Simpson drove to Harrisburg, PA., with his grandson to cheer the team on in its NCAA Regional appearance. Blood said having engaged and supportive alumni only strengthens the program's legacy.

"What a wonderful example Bob is for how our alumni and donors can make a lasting impact with a program they care so much about, all these years later. We can't thank Bob and all who give back enough."

PRECISION OPTICS LAB

Within 100 miles of Keene State, more than 30 companies thrive in singlepoint diamond turning machining, thin films, specialty glass, and advanced optics, with Moore Nanotechnology Systems in Swanzey and AMTEK Precitech in Keene among them.

Starting this fall, Keene State will offer a one-year precision optics certificate that provides practical skills to get job-ready quickly and help fill an important-and hyper-regional-workplace need.

Enrollees will learn in the College's new dedicated optics lab, the Kingsbury Center for Diamond Turning Excellence, on the same high-end ultra-precision lathes used in the field.

The Kingsbury Fund awarded a substantial grant to kickstart the new learning space, which features two types of high-end diamond turning lathes that create optical components at nanometer-scale accuracy. Metrology systems are also in the lab to provide students with handson experience to prepare them for measuring precision components to ensure accuracy.

Nanotechnology has diverse applications, including medicine, materials science, electronics, and environmental science.

In 2024. Keene State launched a partnership with the American Center for Optics Manufacturing, Inc., to increase capacity for work-ready technicians. Keene State is the first four-year post-secondary institution



to partner with the US Department of Defense consortium, which has capacity-building goals, including upping the number of trained technicians nationwide from fewer than 50 each year to 800 annually.

Keene State is proud to be part of that frontline effort. Its new startup program, lab, and state-of-the-art equipment would not be possible without the generous financial support of donors and the strength of its local and national ties and partnerships.

COHEN INSTITUTE

Several exciting developments resulted from a transformative gift from Rick and Jan Cohen in September 2024—the largest in the College's history—which launched the Cohen Institute: Funding to support student internships, the launch of an inaugural graduate fellowship, and a new Student Scholar program for undergraduates.

This fall, three student interns from different academic programs across campus will be compensated for their work on specific projects and initiatives: livestreaming and video creation about the Institute's work; development of the Youth Leadership Institute for its summer 2026 launch; and originating workshops and materials related to the Institute's special collection in Holocaust and Genocide Studies in the Keene State Archives.

The graduate fellowship planned for spring 2026 will be fully developed this fall, said Dr. Kate Gibeault, Director, Cohen Institute for Holocaust and Genocide Studies. noting that graduate students in Holocaust and Genocide Studies and History and Archives are eligible to apply

The Student Scholar program will receive funding for a recipient to conduct original research to advance the field of Holocaust and Genocide Studies alongside faculty experts on campus. The first recipient will work with Prof. Jonathan Gitelson, the inaugural Cohen Institute Faculty Scholar. After the pilot year, the program will fund two or more student scholars each year.

Given retroactively to students who have done great leadership work, the award instead becomes more of a seed grant to provide recipients with resources and support to do leadership work in this area. The award will continue to be offered annually.

This year's recipient, Bianca Bostwick '27, a Holocaust & Genocide Studies and Secondary Education doublemajor, created a simulation activity in which high school students role-played rewriting the genocide convention in the United Nations.

Students in Katie Littlefield's genocide class at Pinkerton Academy in Derry, NH, participated in the interactive exercise.

"(My students) enjoyed this application of the idea of genocide in a more modern way and a different way," Littlefield says. "They were having a conversation about the definition of genocide in 2025, which is pretty meaningful, and a big takeaway from the course. I had already asked Bianca if it would be OK if I used her simulation in my courses and classes, and she said 'yes,' which I'm excited and thankful about."

Says Bianca, "This opportunity gave me hope and confidence that this is my calling. I can create engaging activities to enhance students' understanding of genocide and the world around them."

HIGH-IMPACT LEARNING

Keene State believes some of the most transformative learning experiences happen outside the classroom. Whether it is a paid internship that sets a career in motion, or a travel study experience, high-impact learning experiences can change the course of a student's life.

Here we look at two outstanding examples of high-impact learning experiences: one, an international travel experience that was part of the Morris-August Honors Program; and two, a series of donor-funded internships in the College's Sustainable Product Design and Innovation (SPDI) program.

ELLIS FAITH WHITE '28

2 WEEKS, 5 CITIES, 'SUCH A BLAST!'

Global engagement is not a buzz term at Keene State; it's a core component of a continual quest to deepen and strengthen educational experiences. Our students can choose to study outside of the United States—more than 20 destinations from the Czech Republic to Germany to Japan to Spain—with the College's university and program partners.

They may also select from domestic programs like the National Student Exchange and the Washington Center internship program. Often, tuition costs are the same as classes, and classes abroad count for academic credit.

And for students in the Morris-August Honors Program, scholarships cover much of the cost of these eye-opening, once-in-a-lifetime educational adventures.

Students return confident and inspired, and their ambitions and dreams, we learn, are stronger than ever.

Here is proof, in the form of one class and one student's exciting and transformative adventure abroad.

Ellis Faith White doesn't summon passion; it's just there. The spark stays lit.

Bright, curious, and driven, Ellis was accepted into a third-year Global Engagement Honors class—Western Classical Music—taught by Dr. Christina Wright-Ivanova, professor of music, this past spring.

"It was an awesome semester," Wright-Ivanova said.

"We studied several major composers, context, language, visual arts, and historical issues related to the development of 'art music' in Germany, Austria, and the Czech Republic during the Classical, Romantic, 20th Century, and Contemporary periods."

The class didn't end there. In May, all eight students—non-music majors, except for Ellis—packed their bags and traveled to Munich, Salzburg, Vienna, Brno, and Prague for a 13-day European excursion.



It was the kind of study-based exploration not uncommon for Keene State students.

The College's Morris-August Honors Program, of which Ellis is a part, has prepared hundreds of Keene State students to be future global leaders by providing opportunities to learn about new perspectives and diverse cultures, first in the classroom and then internationally.

In its twelfth year, the program has granted more than \$2 million since its inception to underwrite scholarships, teaching and learning resources, and travel-related expenses. It is named in recognition of significant support from the William T. Morris Foundation and its president, Bruce August '13.

"The foundation is honored to support the Keene State Honors Program," said Bruce. "The funding has been used to help the best and brightest afford a highly rated college program. Many of the students will become first generation college graduates. Our hope is that after graduation, they continue to have success in their chosen career path."

The recent European trip was largely funded by the Honors Program, covering travel, lodging, concerts, transportation, and other experiences. Students like Ellis have to fund their meals and optional items like side excursions or souvenirs, so the two-week trip cost Ellis about \$600.

KSC music professor Dr. Sandra Howard also accompanied the students, whose majors included History, Political Science, Visual Arts, Architecture, Education, and Sustainable Product Design & Innovation.

A Concord, NH, native, Ellis is president of the Class of 2028 and counts building with Legos among her favorite hobbies. Preferring to stay busy, Ellis also tacked on a minor in psychology. Ellis is driven and considers it "a unique privilege to have one of my greatest passions, music, be my education and future career."

Ellis said the recent "formative" trip, which kicked off in Germany, was filled with cultural enlightenment and personal growth of the kind unimaginable in such a short time.

"We had some amazing artistic experiences at museums like the Alte Pinakothek in Munich and the Belvedere Palace in Vienna. They provided more context for the value of the arts in Western culture."

"I'd love to learn more about the culture of all types of music, Western and otherwise, and travel to other locations to gain a wider perspective on how culture influences and is reflected in music. I believe authenticity is such a crucial part of music-making. The trip gave me the confidence to feel safe in large, foreign cities, and to know I can travel independently."

Ellis and the other trip-mates saw six professional performances. "It was fascinating to see the risks and choices taken in European art and performance," Ellis said.

A favorite performance was Leoš Janáček's opera Jenůfa. at the National Theatre in Prague. It featured worldrenowned actors and musicians, and was held in a stunning hall. "Breathtaking," Ellis said. "It was interesting to see how architecture and visual art styles connect back to the musical styles of composers from the three countries during different periods."

Be it visual, performance, or musical arts, Ellis's creative spirit takes many forms. At one time, acting was on Ellis's "what-I-want-to-do" list. But her musical roots are strong and pull Ellis back.

"My Nana was a pianist and choir director. While I'm not amazing at piano, her musical legacy lives on in me, and I think of her whenever I create music. To honor a loved one in such a unique way. It's a constant reminder of a woman I loved so much."


Ellis hopes to teach music in a school, and voice or flute lessons on the side. Becoming a music therapist has some appeal, too, but later on. "Most importantly, I just want to use music as a vehicle to help others and bring them joy."

BUILDING CAREERS & THE NH WORKFORCE

SUSTAINABLE PRODUCT DESIGN & INNOVATION INTERNSHIPS

A destination major for students, SPDI is the only program in New England that combines industrial design, project management, and manufacturing engineering technologies with the lens of sustainability and sound business practices.

The SPDI program, which offers both a major and a minor, embodies the interdisciplinary lens that sets so many of Keene State's programs apart—and sets students up to be leaders far into their careers and lives.

SPDI students graduate with hands-on, project-based experience that prepares them for careers in a fast-moving environment. The SPDI program is therefore a key driver of workforce development in the Monadnock region, which boasts a highly diverse and sophisticated manufacturing sector that plays on a global scale.

A critical component of the program is its internship program for majors, which gives students real-world job experience at an area company. And, thanks to donors like Engelberth Construction, SPDI internships are accessible to all.

For many Keene State students, an internship can be out of reach from a financial standpoint, whether it is the cost of taking time away from another paying job, or finding transportation funds or purchasing workplace appropriate attire.

But donors like Engelberth Construction are removing this barrier, for the good of the student and the region. Said Engelberth CEO Pierre LeBlanc '78, "Keene State was my first foray away from home and it was a good experience for me. It's nice to give back and I hope this funding allows students to have a similar experience as me, and helps them to have one less thing to worry about."

Engelberth's investment also took advantage of a generous \$500,000 match created through a gift from the Krantz family in honor of KSC professor Dr. Delmar "Del" Ogg.

Asked what he values about Keene State, Pierre said "It's quite a valued resource for New Hampshire and the region. Here at Engelberth we have several Keene graduates employed, including our safety director. I'm hoping that future students have it as good as I did. That's why I have supported Keene State over the years."

It is gifts like Engelberth's that make the program even more attractive to students, and makes their experience while in it all the more powerful. SPDI program students go through the program seeking to answer one critical question: "How can we best live without degrading our life-support system and create conditions that nurture the flourishing of other beings and of future generations?"

Thus, SPDI graduates have, and will continue to have, a forward-thinking positive impact on the world around all of us for years to come.

LeVine Mellion Parent Award

From the Archives

100 Years of Greek Life

Greek life at Keene Normal School began in the early 1920s, a time of growth and transformation on campus. It was sparked by the initiative of five pioneering male students-Sheldon Barker, Albert Brooks, Henry Dumont, Edgar Howe, and Harold Mayette—who recognized the value of brotherhood, leadership, and social connection. Together, they founded Kappa Delta Phi, holding their first official meeting on April 9, 1921.

Though the fledgling organization showed promise, it faced challenges early on. After just one year, the group's faculty advisor left the college, and without that guidance, activity within the fraternity dwindled. However, the bonds between the members endured, and their commitment to the ideals of the fraternity remained strong. In June 1925, Kappa Delta Phi was formally revived, laying a more solid foundation for the future of Greek life on campus.

That same year, a second fraternity, Alpha Pi Tau, was established, further expanding the presence of Greek organizations. These early groups offered more than just social opportunities—they became centers of leadership, service, and campus engagement, helping to shape student life for generations.

Over the next century, Greek life at Keene would evolve to reflect the changing needs and values of its student body. What began as a small group of young men seeking camaraderie has grown into a rich tradition, with numerous fraternities and sororities contributing to the college's culture, community service, and spirit.

As we reflect on 100 years of Greek life, we honor those first visionaries whose efforts created a legacy of connection, service, and pride that continues to this day.




